Whilst moving garden plants when relocating house can seem like a simple process, however this isn't always the case. Home owners like yourselves are warned that you could face legal actions, if you uproot your garden without making it clear to your buyer that you plan to



do so at the point of sale. The reasoning behind this is due to the face that plants in your garden are classed within the fixtures and fittings list which you provide the buyer with during the sale.

We understand that you have no doubt spent many years tending to your garden, so here is our advice on moving your beloved garden.

Preparing your Plants for your moving day!

All cutting and pruning of your plants in preparation for moving day, they must be stored in a dry place a week before the removal day! By doing this you reduce the risk of any of your other effects on the lorry getting wet due to your plants, meaning that you are able to have peace of mind that there will be no cross contamination from your outside effects to your home contents.



plant pots, troughs and containers are not usually moved often if ever moved, frost / weather damage may not be detected until they are moved. So we recommend if you are worried about any of them then it's best for yourself to move and transport them or for you to remove the plant and soil from the inside to relive some of the pressure on the pots, allowing the removal team to move them with less worry for you.
